I was famished and I needed lunch.

Not far from Five Points on Daly Street in Lincoln Heights, I ducked into a nearby Mexican food restaurant that I'd never noticed before, Mela's. Small benches were out on the sidewalk for those who wanted an al fresco eating experience. A lone guitarist plucked out tunes for the passersby.

Once inside, I met the friendly and gregarious owner, Daniel Diaz, and I felt as if I'd come back to my family home. I quickly met Daniel's brother Samuel, who works the restaurant as well.

Daniel pointed to the simple menu on the wall. The menu is very basic, and good. A customer can still ask for any dish they want, and the chef might be able to conjure it up.

"We like to keep the menu simple," he explained, "because this is all a tribute to our beloved mother, Mela. We do this to honor her memory." Wow, I thought, that's beautiful.

I asked Daniel what he suggested I order for lunch and he brought me a steaming bowl of "Carne en su jugo," a delicious bowl of fresh stew with bits of beef and beans and flavored with cilantro. As I sat on the table gazing out the window onto Daly Street, listening to the traditional Mexican music in the background, savoring each bite, I thought that Daniel's mother Mela must have been a wonderful person.

As I enjoyed my little bit of heaven there in Lincoln Heights, Daniel told me that his mother came from Mexico into the United States in the 1950s. She and his grandmother came from the mountainous Zacatecas region in Mexico. "They fed the silver miners who came out of the mines in the mountains," said Daniel

with great pride remembering his beloved mother. "Our store is our way to memorialize our mother and her traditional cooking." Indeed, I felt that this tidy restaurant was a window to the past, with the walls full of the family pictures and pictures of Mela.

"You've got to try the potato taco," bellowed Daniel, putting the attractive plate in front of me. Indeed, it was

a delicious taco, fit for vegans and vegetarians, and delicious to both the eyes and mouth.

Between helping other customers who came in for lunch, I spoke with Daniel and learned that he's also a musician who plays both guitar and keyboards. They plan to offer musical performance sometime beginning May 13th allowing local artists to have a voice. Though the inside seating area is tight, they have a back patio which can seat about 75 patrons (parking in the rear of building for patio entry is thru Daly street next to the Water and Power building) where they expect to have musical performances. He and his brother want to create a friendly environment with Mela's.

"In a way, it's like going into the past here where you can talk to anyone here," he explains. "You can leave your laptop at home," he bellows with a laugh.
